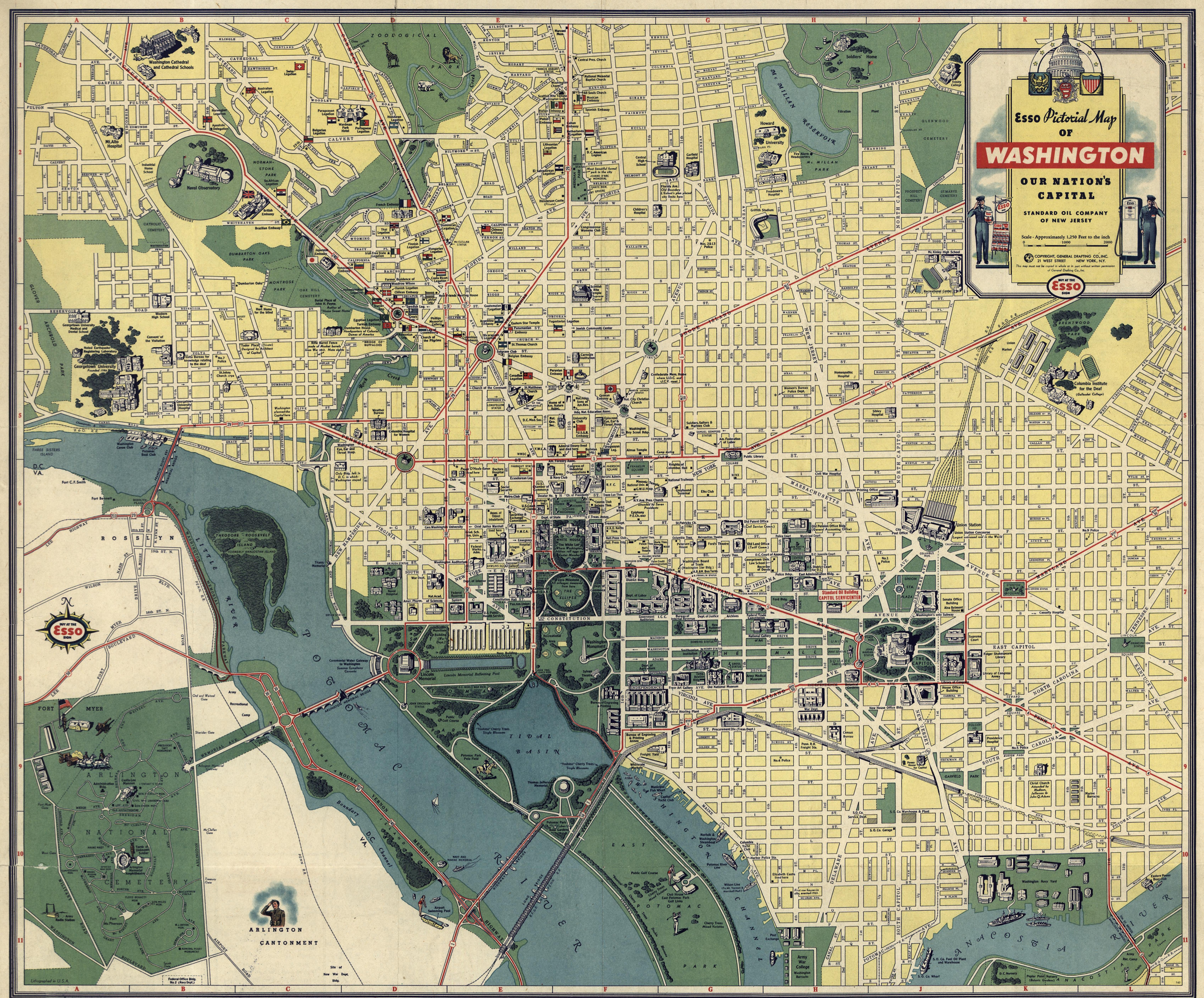


Esso Pictorial Map

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Visitor's Esso Guide to WASHINGTON

Index numbers (A-1) refer to map above which also locates other points of interest not described here. As a wartime measure, buildings marked * were closed when this map went to press. Status of others may be changed without notice. For latest information call Esso Touring Service, NAtional 9865.

AMERICAN PHARMACEUTICAL INSTITUTE (D-7). Historical pharmacy exhibits. Open Monday to Friday 9-5; Saturday 9-1.
AMERICAN RED CROSS (E-7). Main building on 17th Street includes an extensive library and a museum containing numerous models dramatizing scenes of Red Cross activities during war and peace. Open weekdays 9:30-4:30; Sundays 1-4:30.
AQUARIUM. Department of Commerce Building (F-7). About 2,000 specimens of fresh-water fish. Most interesting is the collection of trout which includes albinos. Open Monday to Friday 9-4; Saturday 9-1:30.
ARCHIVES BUILDING (G-7). One of the newest and most majestic federal buildings, housing historical documents and records. Open Monday to Saturday 9-4:30; Sunday 1:30-5.
ARLINGTON (A-9). Largest and most famous of America's military burial grounds. Resting place of the World War Unknown Soldier and other national heroes. Grounds open daily sunrise to sunset. Arlington House,

also called Custis-Lee Mansion, was the home of General Robert E. Lee. Here in the mansion's study he rejected the offer to lead the Union forces. Open 9-6 summer, 9-4:30 winter; admission 10 cents.
ARMY MEDICAL MUSEUM (G-8). Largest medical museum in the U.S. and world's largest medical library. Medical history portrayed in exhibits of surgical and medical equipment, specimens, and wax models. Open Monday to Friday 8:15-5; Saturday 8:15-12:15.
BOTANIC GARDENS (H-8). Outstanding horticultural displays may be viewed Sunday to Friday 9-4, Saturday 9-12.
BUREAU OF ENGRAVING AND PRINTING (E-8). From elevated walkways visitors may observe the fascinating operations in the world's greatest currency-making plant. Frequent guided tours are made from Monday to Friday 8:30-11 a.m. and 1-2 p.m.
CAPITOL (J-8). Gleaming white by day and floodlighted by night, the Capitol dominates the City of Washington. Spacious grounds, landscaped with hundreds of trees and shrubs, form a perfect setting for the massive building with its huge cast iron dome. Of outstanding interest are the chambers of the Senate and House of Representatives and many works of art. Open weekdays 9-4:30.
CHEERY TREES. Cherry-blossom time transforms large portions of Potomac Park (E-9) into great and lovely masses of white and pink. The single-blossom trees usually flower early in April, and the double-blossom trees are two or two later.
CORCORAN ART GALLERY (E-7). Sculptures, paintings, and other works of art. The Corcoran collection is especially interesting because it records the chronological development of American art. Open Monday 12-4:30; Tuesday to Saturday 9-4:30. Sunday and holidays 2-5. Admission Monday, Wednesday, and Friday 25 cents. DUMBARTON OAKS RESEARCH LIBRARY (C-4). Collection of Byzantine and Early Christian art objects of metal, ivory sculpture, and textiles. Open weekdays 10-4.
EMBASSIES AND LEGATIONS. Some of the most imposing are to be seen on Massachusetts Avenue. All are located on the map by flags and are identified by "No Parking" signs and names on curbs.
FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION, Department of Justice (G-7). The laboratories, fingerprint files, crime museum, and other activities of the "G-Men" are shown and explained to visitors on guided tours

conducted as the demand warrants. Exhibits from the latest and most notorious cases may be seen also. Building open Monday to Friday 9:30-3; Saturday 9:30-11:30.
FEDERAL RESERVE BUILDING (E-7). This monumental new white marble structure typifies the classic architecture of the federal buildings. Open Monday to Friday 9-4:30; Saturday 9-1.
FOLGER SHAKESPEARE LIBRARY (K-8). This world-famous collection of Shakespeare material assembled by the late Henry C. Folger contains 83,000 volumes including First Folios and latest research material. Finest collection of its kind outside of England. Exhibition gallery and reproduction of Elizabethan courtyard theatre open Monday to Saturday 9-4:30.
FORD'S THEATRE (Lincoln Museum) (G-6). Scene of the assassination of President Lincoln. Exhibited here are many of Lincoln's books, furniture, mementos of his presidential campaigns, and newspaper accounts and relics of his assassination. Open weekdays 9-4:30; Sunday and holidays 12:30-4:30. Admission 10 cents.
FREER GALLERY OF ART (G-8). Notable collection of Asiatic art and numerous paintings and etchings by James Whistler may be seen by visitors daily except Monday 9-4:30.
GOVERNMENT PRINTING OFFICE (H-6). World's largest and best-equipped printing plant, covering many acres of floor space. Among documents, pamphlets, and other material printed here is the Congressional Record. 90-minute tours conducted Monday to Friday 10-3; Saturday 10-11, as the demand warrants.
INTERIOR DEPARTMENT MUSEUM (E-7). Graphic presentations of the work of the Department's bureaus including Reclamation, Indian Affairs, National Park Service, Mines, U.S. Geological Survey, and the Division of Territories and Island Possessions. Open Monday to Friday 9-4:30; Saturday 8-2.
LIBRARY OF CONGRESS (J-8). One of the world's greatest libraries. Foremost among its nearly 10,000,000 items are the originals of the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States. A Gutenberg Bible and other historic documents also are

on display. Open Monday to Friday 9 a.m. to 10 p.m., Saturday 9-6, Sunday and holidays 2-10.
LINCOLN MEMORIAL (D-8). Magnificent white marble building at the west end of the Mall. Interior is dominated by a huge seated statue of Lincoln by Daniel Chester French. Strikingly lighted at night. Open daily 9 a.m. to 9:30 p.m.
MEMORIAL CONTINENTAL HALL (E-7). Headquarters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. Museum of Revolutionary War relics and many state chapter rooms furnished in Colonial style. Open Monday to Friday 9:30-4:30; Saturday 9-1.
NATIONAL ACADEMY OF SCIENCES (D-7). The wonders of nature are strikingly illustrated in a series of exhibits, including working models. (Closed during the national emergency.)
NATIONAL GALLERY OF ART (G-7). The "American Louvre." Paintings and sculpture, including the noted Mellon and Kress collections. Building given by the late Andrew W. Mellon. Open weekdays 10-5; Sunday 2-5.
NATIONAL GEOGRAPHIC SOCIETY (F-5). Here in Explorers' Hall are trophies of Geographic Society expeditions and many dramatic photographic enlargements. Open Monday to Friday 9-5.
PAN AMERICAN UNION (E-7). North and South American architecture is blended in this structure. A tropical climate maintained inside permits the growth of palms, bananas, coffee, and rubber. Striking relief maps, models, photographs, and tropical birds. Open Monday to Friday 9-4; Saturday 9-12:15.
PHILLIPS MEM. GALLERY (D-4). Modern French and American paintings with a few Old Masters. Open weekdays 11-6; Sunday 2-6.
POST OFFICE DEPARTMENT (G-7). An extensive philatelic exhibit is maintained here. Open Monday to Friday 9-4:30; Saturday 9-12.
SMITHSONIAN GROUP (G-8). World-famous Smithsonian Institution contains national history and scientific exhibits from many lands. Other buildings are the New National Museum containing natural history exhibits, the Old National Museum featuring arts and industries. An aviation display is in

a separate structure. Buildings open weekdays 9-4; Sunday 1:30-4:30.
SUPREME COURT (J-7). This fine example of classic architecture is one of the most magnificent of the newer government buildings. Open weekdays 9-4:30 (closed Saturday afternoon in summer).
WASHINGTON CATHEDRAL (B-1). One of the largest, most beautifully designed ecclesiastical structures in America. Guided tours on weekdays 9-5; Sunday following 11 a.m. and 4 p.m. services.
WASHINGTON CHAPEL ("MORMON") (F-1). Constructed of native Utah marble. Guided tours following organ recitals Monday, Wednesday, and Saturday at 8 p.m.
WASHINGTON MONUMENT (E-8). Stately memorial shaft towering 555 feet and dominating the Mall. Wide-spreading views in all directions from observatory reached by elevator. Open daily 9-6.
WHITE HOUSE (F-6). This essentially simple building is the focal point for many broad avenues. General visiting discontinued during the national emergency; service men in uniform admitted during limited hours Friday and Saturday.
ZOOLOGICAL PARK (D-1). Outstanding collection of animals, birds, and reptiles. Open daily 9-5. Feeding times: monkeys 10 and 2:30; elephants 2:30; lions and tigers 1:30 except Saturday and Sunday; small mammals 2:30.

DIVISION OF WASHINGTON

The District of Columbia is divided into four sections, North West (N.W.), North East (N.E.), South West (S.W.), and South East (S.E.). Where no designation is made, North West is generally implied. Sections are separated by North, South, and East Capitol Streets, and by an imaginary line extending west from the Capitol. Cross streets are numbered and lettered from these dividing lines, with numbered streets running north and south, lettered streets running east and west.



How to Drive in Washington

Posted Routes are shown thus: U.S. Routes D.C. Routes One-way streets. Drive to the right through safety zones. Speed limit 25 m.p.h. unless otherwise marked. Stop for street cars: ten feet behind nearest exit. Observe proper lanes for right turn, left turn, and straight. Pedestrians are required to observe all traffic light signals.

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
